





## Creating a Strategic Plan For the Frenchtown School District

Session 1 of 3

What Are the Strengths, Achievements, and Challenges of the Frenchtown School District?

On September 20, 2017, Frenchtown School District administration, Board of Education members, staff, parents and community members came together to initiate strategic planning. The first evening's topic was focused on the strengths, achievements, and challenges of the Frenchtown School District. The meeting began with a welcome and introductions by Board of Education President, Kate Nugent. Daria Wasserbach, Superintendent, presented an excellent overview of the current "state of the schools." Gwen Thornton, assisted by Maryann Friedman New Jersey School Boards representatives, reviewed the strategic planning process the group would be undertaking.

The meeting began with welcoming remarks by Kate Nugent, Board President. Gwen Thornton and Maryann Friedman from New Jersey School Boards Association facilitated the strategic planning process with an overview of the September 20, 2017 meeting and an introduction to the visioning exercise that the group would be undertaking.

To begin the visioning process, participants were asked to picture themselves away from the district for 5 years and returning to find the Frenchtown School District on the cover of TIME magazine, with the caption "21<sup>st</sup> Century Success." The participants were asked to write a title for the magazine article and to envision what was written in the article that warranted such high recognition — what programs / services / curriculum / student outcomes / best practices / facilities would you expect to see in your school district that are succeeding.
